frames and framing in documentary comics explores how graphic narratives reframe global crises while also interrogating practices of fact finding an analog print phenomenon in an era shaped by digitalization documentary comics formulates a distinct counterapproach to conventional journalism in what ways are facts being presented and framed what is documentary honesty in a world of fake news and post truth politics how can the stories of marginalized peoples and neglected crises be told the author investigates documentary comics in its unique relationship to framing graphic narratives are essentially shaped by a reciprocal relationship between the manifest frames on the page and the attention to the cognitive frames that they generate to account for both the textuality of comics and its strategic use as rhetoric the author combines theories of framing analysis and cognitive narratology with comics studies and its attention toward the medium's visual frames

memories are not static or frozen remaining in particular sites or places within and belonging to particular groups cultures or nations rather memory travels broadly speaking memory has travelled because of the demographic

displacements brought about by modernity's extremes: slavery, colonialism, ethnic cleansing and genocide, and also because of the trade, travel and migration made possible by globalisation, whether social movement is violent, exilic, migratory, emancipatory or oppressive, it is accompanied by memory, with the movement of people, memories of modernity's histories and postmodern legacies meet, correspond and often become mutually constitutive, even where memories compete with each other for cultural dominance, mutual dialogue and recognition is implicit if not explicit, memories travel through and across cultures and national boundaries, a process increasingly facilitated by mass media technologies, this collection explores a range of case studies of transcultural memory as well as theorising the mobility of memory as it travels, it was originally published as a special issue of the journal *parallax*.

Kriege und ihre Folgen spielen in Comics und Graphic Novels seit dem Beginn des 20. Jahrhunderts eine thematisch herausragende Rolle. Bereits im vorherigen Jahrbuch Vol. XXIV 2018 widmeten sich einige Beiträge diesem Thema. Autoren wie Joe Sacco reagieren aber auch im Rahmen des Comic Journalismus auf aktuelle Konflikte und Krisen. Zwei umfangreiche Beiträge widmen sich detailliert diesem Comic Journalismus sowie Art Spiegelman's Reaktion auf 9/11 in seinem *In the Shadow of No Towers*. Darüber hinaus beschäftigen sich Beiträgerinnen und Beiträger mit der Kriegsliteratur im und nach dem ersten Weltkrieg am Beispiel von bislang wenig beachteten Texten von Alfred Hein, Mara Heinze, Hofrichter, Max Hermann, Neide und Paul Linde sowie mit der nationalsozialistischen Propaganda. Since the beginning of the 20th century wars and their consequences play a significant role in comics and graphic novels. Several contributions of the previous annual Vol. XXIV 2018 have already dealt with that subject. However, authors like Joe Sacco also react to recent conflicts and crisis with comic journalism. Two comprehensive contributions analyse in detail both comic journalism and Art Spiegelman's reaction to September 11 attacks in his comic *In the Shadow of No Towers*.

additionally the contributors focus on war literature during and after the first world war concentrating on less known writings from authors like alfred hein mara heinze hofrichter max hermann neïe paul linde or nazi propaganda

first runner up for the 2019 ray and pat browne award for the best edited collection in popular and american culture cultures of war in graphic novels examines the representation of small scale and often less acknowledged conflicts from around the world and throughout history the contributors look at an array of graphic novels about conflicts such as the boxer rebellion 1899 1901 the irish struggle for national independence 1916 1998 the falkland war 1982 the bosnian war 1992 1995 the rwandan genocide 1994 the israel lebanon war 2006 and the war on terror 2001 the book explores the multi layered relation between the graphic novel as a popular medium and war as a pivotal recurring experience in human history the focus on largely overlooked small scale conflicts contributes not only to advance our understanding of graphic novels about war and the cultural aspects of war as reflected in graphic novels but also our sense of the early twenty first century in which popular media and limited conflicts have become closely interrelated

as the son of ww ii era parents journalist joe sacco was heavily affected by the plight of people around the world forced from their homes while under foreign occupation his palestine series of comic books won the national book award in 1996 and his safe area gorazde and the fixer have earned him a unique place in the world of comics and graphic novels this book is an intriguing look at a popular writer and includes numerous examples of his color and black and white illustrations

smith edward still and jing zhang in drawing the past volume 2 comics and the historical imagination in the world contributors seek to examine the many ways in which history worldwide has been explored and re represented through comics and how history is a complex construction of imagination reality and manipulation through a close analysis of such works as v for vendetta maus and persepolis this volume contends that comics are a form of mediation between sources both primary and secondary and the reader historical comics are not drawn from memory but offer a nonliteral interpretation of an object re constructed in the creator s mind indeed when it comes to history stretching the limits of the imagination only serves to aid in our understanding of the past and through that understanding shape ourselves and our futures this volume the second in a two volume series is divided into three sections history and form historical trauma and mythic histories the first section considers the relationship between history and the comic book form the second section engages academic scholarship on comics that has recurring interest in the representation of war and trauma the final section looks at mythic histories that consciously play with events that did not occur but nonetheless inflect our understanding of history contributors to the volume also explore questions of diversity and relationality addressing differences between nations and the cultural historical and economic threads that bind them together however loosely and however much those bonds might chafe together both volumes bring together a range of different approaches to diverse material and feature remarkable scholars from all over the world

addresses the range of his award winning work from his early comics stories as well as his groundbreaking journalism *palestine* 1993 and *safe area to go* 2000 to *footnotes in gaza* 2009 and his most recent book *the great war* 2013 a graphic history of world war i first in the series *critical approaches to comics artists* this edited volume explores sacco's comics journalism and features established and emerging scholars from comics studies cultural studies geography literary studies political science and communication studies sacco's work has already found a place in some of the foundational scholarship in comics studies and this book solidifies his role as one of the most important comics artists today sections focus on how sacco's comics journalism critiques and employs the standard of objectivity in mainstream reporting what aesthetic principles and approaches to lived experience can be found in his comics how sacco employs the space of the comics page to map history and war and the ways that his comics function in the classroom and as human rights activism the comics of joe sacco offers definitive exciting approaches to some of the most important and necessary comics today by one of the most acclaimed journalist artists of our time

this penultimate work in john lent's series of bibliographies on comic art gathers together an astounding array of citations on american cartoonists and their work author john lent has used all manner of methods to gather the citations searching library and online databases contacting scholars and other professionals attending conferences and festivals and scanning hundreds of periodicals he has gone to great length to categorize the citations in an easy to use scholarly fashion and in the process has helped to establish the field of comic art as an important part of social science and humanities research the ten volumes in this series covering all regions of the world constitute the largest printed bibliography of comic art in the world and serve as the beacon guiding the burgeoning fields of animation
